U. S. HELD PLEDGED IN NEW GUINEA ISSUE

THE HAGUE, the Netherlands, Oct. 27—Dutch public opinion is satisfied that Dr. Joseph M. A. H. Luns, Netherlands Foreign Minister, brought back from his recent visit to Washington a moral commitment by the United States to oppose Indonesia, if that nation should use force against Netherlands New Guinea.

At his first news conference since his return Saturday, Dr. Luns avoided saying that much flatly today. Instead he said he

preferred to stand on the wording of a statement he had made in the United States Oct. 8 with the approval of Secretary of State Dulles.

This was to the effect that the United States had no reason to believe Indonesia contemplated the use of force, but that the United States adhered strictly to the principle that violence must not be used to effect territorial changes and that this policy applied to Taiwan as much as to New Guinea.

The parallel between Taiwan and New Guinea expressed in the statement he made in the United States came from the Washington officials he talked with, Dr. Luns said.
