Secret Parley on New Guinea Opens in U.S. Today

THE HAGUE, the Netherlands, March 19 (Reuters)—The Dutch Government announced today that it would begin secret talks with Indonesia in the United States tomorrow on the Dutch-Indonesian dispute over western New Guinea.

The Government said it hoped the preliminary talks "might lead to negotiations on a peaceful solution of the dispute on control of the territory, administered by the Netherlands.

The talks will be held in the presence of a third person, an American, who was invited to attend by U Thant, Acting Secretary General of the United Nations.

A Dutch communiqué said the parties had agreed to hold the talks in secret and not to publish the names of the participants, or the place where the talks would be held.

"The Government continues earnestly to seek a solution by means of these talks," the communiqué said. "However, confronted with a new and open threat of aggression, it finds itself compelled to review the situation at short notice in view of its responsibility for the in-
